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WHAT IS ACT?

Statewide campaign helping CA cities prevent and mitigate the effects of childhood trauma, including **Adverse Childhood Experiences** (ACEs).

- Bringing together residents, youth, city officials and community leaders to identify priorities and co-design solutions.
- Building networks of people and places throughout CA to change policies and transform systems shaping child wellbeing.
- Led by Public Health Advocates and UCLA
 School of Public Health.
- Overseen by 15-member Equity Advisory Group

<u>Pilot</u>: \$10M in MHSA Admin (Jan '19 – Dec '21) <u>Expansion</u>: \$25M Gen Fund (Jan '22 – Dec '26)





ACT Pilot

1. Establish Equity Advisory Group

2. Hold town hall meetings and conduct public opinion poll to identify priority issues

3. Conduct literature review to identify evidencebased strategies to address priority issues

4. Recruit and support pilot cities, test and refine the ACT model, prepare for statewide expansion



Equity advisory group developed **ACT** <u>VALUES</u>

- **Prevention:** Be proactive rather than reactive
- Equity: Focus on the needs in historically disadvantaged communities
- Youth leadership: "Nothing about us without us"
- **Courage:** Take risks, stand up for what's right, address challenging situations
- **Collaboration:** Bring cities together statewide to share, learn, and develop innovative solutions
- **Power Shift:** Embed community voices into policy development, systems change, and program planning

2. Establish a Core Team

- 2+ residents
- 2+ city officials/staff
- 2+ child-focused CBOs
- **3.** Establish a Youth Design Team
- 4. Provide an ACT coach
- 5. Provide planning grant (up to \$50K)
- 6. Expand the Core Team to include broad representation of youth, residents and organizations
- 7. Join a Learning Community

LESSONS LEARNED

- ACT is making ACEs a priority: city leaders, CBOs, residents are participating
- ACT has just begun: a lot more cities want to participate
- ACT breaks down barriers: between CBOs/cities, between cities/youth
- **COVID has made ACT is more relevant than ever:** child trauma, family stress (ACEs = adverse COVID experiences)
- We have learned how to be ever more effective
 - Different language in different communities
 - Focus on sustainability (policy and systems change)
 - We can organize communities virtually








ACT Reauthorization

\$25 Million for 5 year from General Fund (2022- 26)

- Provide financial & technical assistance to support at least 30 cities in changing at least 3 of the 6 community conditions to prevent childhood trauma and counter its effects.
- 2. Educate and raise awareness among partners, decision-makers and communities about policy, systems, and environmental change strategies to improve the wellbeing of CA children.
- 3. Continue support of **Equity Advisory Group** to guide implementation.



Data to Action: Evaluation Metrics



- 1. Provide cities with data **dashboard** to help them **identify problems** and **establish priorities**
- 2. Include **detailed measures** specific to the Community Action Areas being addressed.
- 3. Key Informant Interviews will determine how the extent to which community conditions have improved.
- 4. Annual progress reports to support continuous improvement
