402	Governor increased trial court funding by five percent for a total of \$86.3 million. In addition, the Administration included an increase of \$42.8 million to reflect increased health benefit and retirement adjustment costs for trial court employees. Finally, the proposed budget included \$30.9 million to cover a short-fall in trial court revenue.	Assembly \$110,000

Senate approved the Governor's proposal and augmented the funding by \$110 million. \$100 million for increased trial court funding and \$10 million to reduce the annual Immediate and Critical Needs Account Transfer.

Assembly augmented trial court funding by \$110 million and adopted placeholder trailer bill specifying accountability measures and reporting requirements.

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Senate approved the Administration's proposal. In addition, the Senate increased the annual training for CDCR institutional staff by 16 hours for a total of \$24 million and provided \$500,000 General Fund for an independent evaluation of the CDCR correctional positions minimal education requirements and current educational level of the staff.

Assembly adopted the Administration's proposal and included budget bill language requiring that any unspent funds revert to the General Fund.

Governor proposed draft trailer bill language that would provide \$500 million in additional jail construction bond financing.

Senate rejected the Governor’s proposal and instead provided \$500 million in lease-revenue bond financing for county construction projects designed to provide rehabilitative services and housing to individuals convicted of crimes. Those projects can include, but are not limited to, jail construction, transitional housing, day reporting centers, mental health treatment facilities, and substance abuse treatment facilities. Decisions concerning the proposed projects and subsequent grant applications are to be made by county boards of supervisors.
