Development of a continuum of children's mental health crisis services	\$ 50,000	Establish a one-time grant program to build capacity for the continuum of children’s crisis services. This continuum of services includes, but is not limited to, crisis residential programs, crisis stabilization services, mobile crisis support teams, family support services, and training. Research shows that the state has not successfully built out the full continuum of services required to fully meet the needs of children and families in mental health crisis.
Community Services Infrastructure Grants	\$ 50,000	Provide grants to locals for infrastructure repairs/upgrades/expansions. This would go to non-governmental entities. Not for land purchases. Would provide 1-time resources to providers focused on homelessness, human trafficking, Domestic Violence.
First Year of Access to Justice Funding	\$ 49,100	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • \$11 million - Dependency Counsel Program (this increase is in addition to the \$11 million augmentation approved in Item 5 of this agenda); • \$7 million – Dependency Counsel "hold Harmless funding"; • \$10 million - Equal Access Fund; • \$9 million - Court Reporters in family court proceedings; • \$2.1 million for Appellate Projects (\$750,000 for Supreme Court appellate project work on death penalty cases and \$1.35 million for Five Courts of Appeal appellate projects work on non-death penalty cases); • \$10 million - County Law Libraries.
Human Trafficking Grants	\$ 10,000	Extension of last year's grant program
STD epidemic grants	\$ 5,000	Focusing on hot-spots (Counties with STD case increases above 80%)
Napa Jail	\$ 20,000	Funding to support 20% of the cost of Napa's uninhabitable jail (Napa paying \$80 million with a new tax). Need has been justified by Napa.
Regional Crime Task Force Grants	\$20,000	\$20 million grant program for local governments experiencing spikes in violent crime.

Drug Overdose Prevention Grants for nonprofits and government entities (law enforcement/first responders)	\$ 5,000	Funding to purchase naloxone kits for nonprofits and governmental entities (law enforcement/first responders) to be used to reduce the rate of fatal drug overdose caused by prescription analgesics and other drugs. It is estimated these kits would save 1,200 lives and reduce hospitalization rates for treatment of overdoses.
Funds for uninhabitable Police Station	\$ 4,000	Extension of last year's grant program
Homeless Youth and Exploitation Program	\$ 14,000	Expansion of program currently run by OES
Increase Proposition 47 Funding	\$ 10,000	Funding to offset unanticipated state costs associated with Proposition 47 (2014)
Body Camera Grants for local Law Enforcement	\$ 2,000	\$2 million to reimburse local law enforcement agencies for specified costs associated with outfitting officers with.
Workforce Investment Board: Employment Assistance for Ex Offenders (specifically females)	\$ 1,500	Intended to bring women into "traditionally male" trades.
Workforce Investment Board: Employment Assistance for all Ex Offenders (Male, female, juvenile)	\$ 1,500	Intended to bring more ex-offenders into trades.
Implicit Bias training for Law Enforcement Agencies (Training reimbursement Grant).	\$ 5,000	\$5 million to offset local law enforcement agency costs associated with attending and replicating the Attorney General's Implicit Bias Training. DOJ worked with Stanford and multiple police departments to develop this training. Numerous law enforcement agencies are on a waiting list to receive this training.
San Quentin Computer Programming Space Expansion	\$ 1,800	Facility repairs needed to expand the Computer Coding Program.
Underground Scholars Initiative expansion	\$ 500	Underground Scholars Initiative aims to connect formerly incarcerated UC students with the resources and information necessary to increase those students' prospects of success.
Break It to Make It Pilot Project	\$ 600	Pilot Program focussing on Education, Peer to peer support, job training, and housing assistance with LA City College.
